



1. **Read Submission Requirements Carefully.** - There are no “standards” for file naming conventions, slate requirements, file size restrictions, etc. Every CD’s office has different requirements. *Assume nothing.*

EXAMPLES:

GLORIOSO CASTING

SELF-TAPES INSTRUCTIONS:

PLEASE TAPE IN A WELL LIT PLACE
PLEASE HAVE A SOLID BACKGROUND (Light blue or Light Gray best)
PLEASE HAVE ANOTHER ACTOR READING OFF CAMERA
PLEASE SHOOT AUDITION MID CHEST TO TOP OF HEAD (see example below)
DRESS APPROPRIATELY FOR THE ROLE.
PLEASE DO TWO TAKES – Upload to Eco Cast as separate files

In a separate take:
PLEASE SLATE – Name, Height, Southeast regional city you are hired out of, If a minor AGE
PLEASE GIVE US A CLOSE UP AND A FULL BODY SHOT IN SLATE
UPLOAD SELF TAPES TO ECO CAST AND PLEASE RESPECT THE DEADLINE.
BE PREPARED FOR POTENTIAL CALLBACKS IN NEW ORLEANS.

NAME FILES:
ROLE-FIRST LAST NAME-TAKE 1
ROLE-FIRST LAST NAME-TAKE 2
ROLE-FIRST LAST NAME-SLATE

TALENT NOTES: Please keep the performances grounded and in reality even though some of the situations are super natural.

If you are playing a character who is instructed by our main character JESSE to do “something”, please keep in mind his command (will be in black bold letters), is the WORD OF GOD. You are unable to disobey his commands.

A reminder talent should not shave or cut their hair after submitting an audition, but must be willing to shave and/or cut their hair for the project. All roles are SAG scale + 10%; billing APD; honey wagon ONLY.

Slate Instructions:

Please slate at the BEGINNING of your audition: Name, height, age & DOB only if under 21, and city where you live. *SLATE MUST ALSO INCLUDE A WIDE FULL BODY SHOT*

-We will NOT consider talent who say LA or NY. If you are in those cities, but would like to be considered for these roles, please say New Orleans or the city from which you would be a modified local hire.

-If you live outside of Louisiana, but are willing to work local hire please say so after you say the city in which you live.

-If you are NOT willing to work local hire, DO NOT SAY SO IN YOUR SLATE.

NO TITLE CARDS & NO TRANSITION FADE IN OR SPECIAL EFFECTS SEPARATING SCENES

-Save video file as MP4 or .mov file **100 MB or less**

-Name files correctly: First.LastName.ROLE.agency

WATCH IT BACK TO MAKE SURE IT'S EXCELLENT QUALITY AND ALL IN SYNC WITH NO BACKGROUND DISTRACTIONS OR NOISES

2. **Always shoot in *LANDSCAPE (Horizontal)* mode.** - The only time you would shoot in **PORTRAIT** (Vertical) mode is when you are asked for a “full body shot” as part of the slate.




3. **Use a solid color background.** - A cluttered or multicolored background can distract from showcasing the talent in the scene. Light to medium shades of blue and grey are most readily acceptable, avoid white or black or chromakey colors like dark royal blue or bright green. *Never use yellow*. Paint a wall, or use a backdrop, a solid sheet, or professional seamless paper.



4. **Use Professional lighting.** - Soft diffused lighting is ideal. It needn't be expensive, but soft light in a 3-point lighting configuration is best. You can use any kind of lighting: Soft-boxes, LED panels, china globes, etc. The choices are infinite. The principals are the same.

5. ***Isolate the actor's voice.*** - Use a shotgun mic, or lavalier to separate the actor from the reader. Use the 50% rule: the reader should be only *half the volume of the actor*.



6. ***Treat your self-tape like an actual audition.*** - *Do your homework.* Be off book and ready to go. Do each scene in a complete take; *never edit pieces together to make a complete scene.* Don't do more than a few takes to get the "right" one. There is a diminishing return in repetition as you try to get to "perfect." *Keep it real.*

7. ***Use a professional reader.*** - Another actor is preferred. Timing is critical in this work, and a practiced pro is a much better choice than an untested amateur.


8. ***Don't enter or exit the frame.*** - Don't use an empty screen as your 1st thumbnail, or fade up from black at the beginning of your tape. Treat your audition as if you had already entered, hit your mark, and they've just cut to your close up. To make an "entrance" you can pivot, or turn into position to give the effect that you've "entered." The reverse technique works for "exits." *The first and last thing you want them to see in your tape is you, not blank space.*

You might want to rethink that choice.



9. **End the reading with a solid finish.** - One solid beat or look is a stronger choice than a “diffused” focus at the end. If you look down, then up, then back and then off, the energy dissipates - Make a single strong choice for ending your scene and stick to it. Take your last look and hold it for a few seconds to give yourself a good place to cut. ***One solid beat beats five half beats...every time.***



10. **Get your audition in ASAP.** - Just because the deadline is several days away, it doesn't mean you can drag your feet. Experience teaches us that once they find what they're looking for, *they stop looking*. If your upload is one of 3500 submitted, it makes more sense to be number 12, *not number 1200*.
